

AIM: To provide a universal and unique form of identification for rural areas.

RURAL ADDRESSING – GLADSTONE REGION:

In rural areas house numbers are to be based on increments of 20 metres. At each increment an odd number is to be allocated to the left and an even to the right. The property will adopt the number of closest proximity to the road entrance, and display the number at the entrance (regardless of the actual siting of the rural delivery mail box or house). e.g. (Number 90 would be on the right side 0.9 km from the start. The rationale is that the zero is dropped from the distance i.e. 0.9km is 900m = 90).

One number only will be assigned to each dwelling site. This will be based on the owners nominated point of MAIN access.

RURAL ADDRESS MARKERS:



- ← Top Cap
- ← Rural Address Number
- ← Delineator / Reflector
- ← PVC Post

The rural address number “54” represents a distance of 540 metres from the origin or start point of the road. The even number indicates the dwelling is located on the right hand side of the road (odd numbering is on the left hand side).

LOCATION:

The rural addressing sign is to be installed at the main property turnout/access from the Council’s road. The property owners shall nominate which is the main access point if there is more than one access to the property.

INSTALLATION:

A rural address marker shall be installed in conjunction with the construction of new dwellings in rural areas. Rural address numbers are issued at the request of the property owners. Once the number has been allocated, the marker will be posted and owners will be responsible for the installation.

SURVEY OF RURAL ADDRESS MARKERS:

Property owners will not be required to pay for the cost of supplying the initial marker. However, replacement markers may incur a small fee determined by Council.
